- Born on March 1, 1914 in Oklahoma City.
- Second of three sons. Grandson of slaves.
- Father died when he was three. Raised by his mother.



- Loved music from a young age.
- Attended Tuskegee Institute as a music major. Did not graduate.
- Met Langston Hughes and Richard Wright in New York during Great Depression.
- Took a job writing for the New York Federal Writers program.
- During World War II, joined the U.S. Merchant Marine as a cook.
- Published first novel, *Invisible Man*, in 1952. The novel spent 16 weeks on the best seller list. Won the National Book Award in 1953.
- Taught at several colleges including Bard College, Rutgers University and Yale University.
- Published 2 collections of essays.
- · Married twice. Had no children.
- Received 12 honorary doctorate degrees from several universities including the University of Michigan, Harvard University, and Rutgers University.
- Died on April 16, 1994 at the age of 80 of pancreatic cancer.
- 2nd novel: *Juneteeth*, published in 1999 after his death.
